USE OF NON-CONVENTIONAL ENERGY SOURCE

By Dept. of Physics and Electronics

INTRODUCTION:

A Solar System Installed in the institute Garden and Physics/Electronics Lab

Now a days we are having lot of problems in industries, workshop, in laboratories etc. due to power failure or loadshding.

As we know that solar energy is the most popular option to replace the conventional electric power by the solar energy, it is the natural source which is free and abundant, hence can be utilized anywhere. Solar electric power system has the following advantages:

- 1) Solar energy is freely available. 2) It is available with enough intensity everywhere.
- 3) The cost is low. Only initial investment is required. 4) It is highly durable.
- 5) Easy to maintain. 6) Save lots of electric energy. 7) Used as AC as well as DC power source.

It is economically profitable to all. By using solar energy we can reduce the environmental pollution and global warming.

With these viewpoints we the students of B.Sc. II and Final year Electronics have decided to assemble solar panel electric system in our college campus. We have decided two different systems i.e indoor system and outdoor system.

Solar Garden Light (outdoor):

This system consists of 240 Wp solar panel, 12 V-100 Ah battery, charge controller (dusk to down), 4 W LED lamp, pole, battery box, etc. In this system solar panel will convert light energy into electricity and it is stored into battery. LED lamps (12 No) of wattage 4 W each can operate on this system for whole night. It will be helpful to illuminate the garden and to save the traditional electric energy. This system is installed by B. Sc.-II year Electronics students under the guidance of Mr. Snehal Akotkar, a visiting Teacher. The names of the students are-

Innovative Practice 2: Experiencing "Zero Shadow Day"

Run by Dept. of Physics

Report on 25/05/2016: In Govt. Vidarbha Institute of Science and Humanities, Amravati, the Dept. of Physics organized a program for the student members on May 25 to demonstrate the phenomenon of 'zero shadow'. Zero shadow Day was experienced by standing in an open ground at 12.00 noon.

Head of Physics Department Prof. Dr. S.P. Yawale and the students reached the designated venue by 11.45 am as the phenomenon was just few seconds. The Prof. in-charge of Physics society Dr. V.R. Pande shared the information about the cause of zero shadow with the students in detail after experiencing the phenomenon. Students standing in the open ground saw that, their own shadow completely disappeared for few seconds.

The Director of the Institute Dr. Smt. Sangita S. Yawale explained that, this phenomenon occurs's twice a year in countries lying between Tropic of Cancer (23.5 degrees north latitude) and Tropic of Capricorn (23.5 degrees South latitude). It cannot be experienced by people living in countries north and south of the two latitudes. "Basically zero shadow phenomenon occurs when the Sun is exactly at Zenith. The shadow of a person or any object completely disappears for a few seconds at 12 noon or a few minutes after that further she added that this happens twice a year once, between December solstice (Dec 21/22) and June Solstice (June 20/21) and then again between June solstice and December solstice.

Sun is said to be exactly overhead at any place at 12 noon and at this time the size of shadow of any object is minimum. But that is really not true every day as we do not follow local time but a national one. Zero shadow actually happens on the day when latitude of a place equals the declination of Sun. Amravati's latitude is 21.3 north and hence zero shadow here happens once on May 25 and second time in July. In July, it is generally not observed as it is cloudy on most days.

Zero shadow day has already been seen as early as May 6 and 7 in Kolhapur and Ratnagiri and Sangli. Pune (May 13), Mumbai (May 15) Ahmednagar (May 16), Aurangabad (May 18) and Beed (May 15). In Vidarbha the cities will experience it as Yavatmal (May 22-12:14 pm), Buldhana (May 22 (12:22 pm), Wardha (May 23: 12.13pm), Amravati (May 25, 12:16 pm), Chandrapur (May 19) and Nagpur (May 26-12:10 pm).

IInd year students Namrata Kurhade , Ashwini Kale , Madhuri Bodkhe , Monika Patel , Rutuja Joshi , Nikita Chandure , Nikita Sawarkar , Bharati Pandare, Kajal Dahikar , Rohini Nayab , Ashitosh Deshmukh , Ankush Sikkalwar , Ajay Chune , Rahul Bejinkiwar , Roshan Rajas were present.

Evaluation of Teachers By The Students Feedback Analysis Report 2015-16

At the end of the session, after completing the portion in the syllabus, each department conducts student's feedback for each teacher from students.

For 2015-16, to take feedback on individual teacher's performance from students, a questionnaire containing 3 sections was prepared out of which 2 sections Section A and B contains 9 and 5 questions respectively, section C requires descriptive answer. A random sample of 10 and 5 students was taken for U.G. and P.G. respectively for every teacher. Written feedback forms based on a 5-point scale are used to calculate a score for each teacher for section A and 3- point scale for section B. Section C requires descriptive answer so scores cannot be calculated for this section. But students' suggestions and remarks are conveyed to the teachers. In this written feedback, the students have appreciated many facilities; teacher's planning and organizing quality, teaching-learning process, class management and evaluation process etc. There are some good suggestions which could be implemented to improve the students' facility.

Lowest and highest ratings for questions are noted which helps the teacher for improvement in lowest ratings in the next year. Average score of all the 9 questions is obtained for section A and of all the 5 questions is obtained for section B. This is overall rating of every teacher. Students' opinions are statistically analyzed on 4- point scale for section A and B to find quality level of every teacher. The outcome of the analysis is conveyed to the teachers.

From the **2015-16** (**Section A**) analysis, it is clear that for **U.G.**, **94.59** % of the total staff from all the departments fall into category 4-5- very good i.e. **quality level A,4.06**% fall into category 3-4-good i.e. **quality level B** and 1.35% fall into category 1-2-Unsatisfactory i.e. quality level D and for **P.G. 98.72** % of the staff fall into category 4-5- very good i.e. **quality level A and 1.28** % fall into category 3-4-good i.e. **quality level B**.

From the 2015-16 (Section B) analysis, it is clear that for U.G., 75 % of the total staff from all the departments fall into category 2.5-3.0- very good i.e. quality level A, 19.65%

fall into category 2.0-2.5-good i.e. **quality level B** and **1.78%** fall into category 1.5-2.0-Satisfactory i.e. **quality level C** and **3.57%** fall into category 1.0-1.5-Unsatisfactory i.e. quality level D and for **P.G. 78.46** % of the total staff from all the departments fall into category 2.5-3.0- very good i.e. **quality level A, 13.85%** fall into category 2.0-2.5-good i.e. **quality level B** and **7.69%** fall into category 1.5-2.0-Satisfactory i.e. **quality level C**.

Best Practices of the Institution

1. Title of the Practice: "BLACKBOARD AND JOURNAL CLUB"

Run by Dr. Mumtaz Baig, Associate Professor of Zoology

Goal:

- To make the class room teaching and research material available to the in the form of pdf files
 Masters Degree and PhD students through the web site.
- To provide easy access to the students to digital course material using world wide web.

The Context: Dr. Mumtaz Baig is using ICT enabled teaching methods and particularly using power point presentation for teaching since last 10 years. Many of the time, students ask for the presentation which he was happily sharing with them but this exercise had three main issues (i) students like to copy the stuff into their flash/pen drive which is a time consuming process (ii) ppt slides sometime are bulky and difficult to shares (iii) some student do not have PC but have access to smart cell phone. In addition to masters degree students, project and Ph.D. researcher working in the laboratory of molecular and conservation genetics where lacking a dedicated scheduled for discussion on research papers published in the area of population and conservation genetics.

The Practice: With a motto of providing easy access to the teaching/course material to the masters degree students of zoology a button named as "BLACKBOARD" is added to the laboratory of molecular and conservation genetics web site (www.lmcg.in). The class room teaching course material is made available prior to the lecture which students can easily access through the site. This practice helps in saving papers which are usually being spent while preparing course material by the students. Also through "JOURNAL CLUB" Dr. Baig's lab holds discussions of current articles drawn from broad, interdisciplinary areas which describe meaningful approaches, techniques, and resources in genetics. Ph.D. researcher (compulsorily) and interested PG students (project) will choose the topics/articles and lead the discussion. All lab members, present and past are encouraged to attend. Meetings will be once per month, informal with snacks provided.

Evidence of success: The implementation of ideas has enormously saved the time of sharing the information among students and researchers. Frequent updating of site and Android friendly site is greatly helping students/researcher in providing easy access to the course material. The Android friendly web site enable the student to access the site from their home in remote rural areas also and also became an effective mode of contact with their peers. While downloading the class room course material, the students also update their knowledge related to happenings in the field of population and conservation genetics. More use of ICT enabled methods will greatly help in saving time and keeping our planet green.

Problems encountered and Resources required: The main problem is of hosting and updating of the site. Taking into account the financial burden of maintaining the site with unlimited space, the site is being updated by Dr. Baig himself and uses limited space provided by the hosting site.

2. Title of the Practice: "WOMAN FOR HUMAN"

Run by Women Cell
